Result 1

Improve food security information for decision making

FOCUS AREA 1

Early Warning Systems & Assessment to ensure early action and rapid response

FOCUS AREA 2

Support the implementation of IPC/HC or other analysis tools/process

FOCUS AREA 3

Contribute to multi sector NA and contribute joint analysis

Achievements & Progress:

The FSC teams proactively share with partners alerts received from competent bodies and/or directly coordinates with those (e.g. meteo departments, etc.) For coordination of prepositioning/contingency planning.

In all IPC/CH countries, the FSC is an active member, participates and contributes (and in some cases facilitate) IPC/CH analyses (once or twice / year).

The FSC teams actively contribute to the multi-sector needs assessments and analyses (MIRA, MSNA, HNO, etc.)

Result 2

Pro-actively steer the coordination of the food security response

FOCUS AREA 1

Promote minimum standards of food security assistance are respected.

FOCUS AREA 2

Proactively steer the coordination of FS responses and guide consensus around technical issues

FOCUS AREA 3

Promote the integration of food assistance with agriculture, livelihoods and resilience interventions and other sectors

Achievements & Progress:

In all countries FSC members agree on minimum standard within HRP and/or ad hoc responses (e.g. min. Kcal pp/pd, agriculture kits, cash packages)

FSC teams ensure and plays as a platform for info sharing, technical support, best practices, lessons learned and visibility. FSCs play a *neutral* role in coordinating FSC response and advocate on behalf of FS partners.

Integration between FS domains (Food assistance and Livelihoods) and with other sectors : e.g. RRM, Famine-prevention joint planning, integrated service provision (WASH), environment, protection (including child protection, GBV, etc.);

Improve monitoring & evaluation systems and accountability systems to enhance program quality

FOCUS AREA 1

Improve monitoring and performance of food security responses

FOCUS AREA 2

Monitor and manage operational risks, identify consensus-based solutions

FOCUS AREA 3

Ensure accountability to affected populations

Achievements & Progress:

FSC teams monitor constantly the collective FS response through data collection and analysis. Area of improvement: collective outcome monitoring (measure response impact)

Risk analysis, mitigation and solutions are included by FSC teams and partners into the HNOs, SOPs, preparedness plans, etc.

FSC teams support inter-agency CFM, when existent, and encourage partners to respect AAP standards and make use of referral mechanisms (including linking with protection cluster). Efforts to be scaled up across all countries.

Result 4

Scale-up advocacy, communication and resource mobilization to support the FSC strategy

FOCUS AREA 1

Strengthen communication of specific food security information needed for decision-making

FOCUS AREA 2

Reinforce active participation in inter- cluster, inter-agency standing committee work and IASC subsidiary

FOCUS AREA 3

Enhance advocacy with national governance, international humanitarian, development organisation

Achievements & Progress:

FSC teams work in strengthening communication, through newsletter, FS sitreps, intercluster report

Joint planning and communication efforts with other clusters (e.g. Health, Nutrition, Protection) in different countries; Joint Humanitarian pool appeals, multi-sectoral coordination, call for action on Famine (local and global level)

FSC teams play a key role to advocate for food security on behalf of all partners at local level, with governments and main stakeholder
